

ABOUT THE AUTHORS

Carl H. Coleman is Professor of Law and Director of the Health Law and Policy Program at Seton Hall Law School. Before joining the Seton Hall faculty, he served as Executive Director of the New York State Task Force on Life and the Law, a nationally recognized interdisciplinary commission with a mandate to develop policy recommendations on issues raised by medical advances. He received a J.D., magna cum laude, from Harvard University, where he also received an A.M. in East Asian Studies. He holds a B.S.F.S., cum laude, from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. He has written and lectured extensively on legal and regulatory issues related to human subject research, assisted reproductive technologies, genetic testing and screening, and medical decision making at the end of life. He has served on the Institutional Review Boards at Seton Hall University and the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and has also served as co-chair of the Committee on Ethical Issues in the Provision of Health Care of the New York State Bar Association.

Jerry A. Menikoff is Associate Professor of Law, Ethics, and Medicine and Director of the Institute for Bioethics, Law, and Public Policy, University of Kansas School of Medicine, where he serves as chairperson of the Human Subjects Committee, and Associate Professor of Law, University of Kansas School of Law. He received A.B., J.D. (both magna cum laude) and M.P.P. degrees from Harvard University, and an M.D. from Washington University. He has been a fellow at the University of Chicago's McLean Center for Clinical Medical Ethics, and at Harvard's Center for Ethics and the Professions. He is the author of *Law and Bioethics: An Introduction* (Georgetown University Press), now in its second printing, which was chosen in 2002 by the Association of American University Presses as one of "The Best of the Best from the University Presses: Books You Should Know About." He is also the author of a book about human subject research forthcoming from Oxford University Press, is a member of the Advisory Board for the *Medical Research Law & Policy Report* (BNA), and has served as a special expert for the Office for Human Research Protections.

Jesse A. Goldner is the John D. Valentine Professor of Law at Saint Louis University, where he also holds joint appointments as Professor of Law in Psychiatry and Professor of Pediatrics at the University's School of Medicine, and Professor of Health Care Administration in the University's School of Public Health. He has taught at Saint Louis University since 1973. He was a founder of and served for many years as

Director of the School of Law's Center for Health Law Studies. In addition, for 17 years he was a member of the University's Institutional Review Board, including six years as its chair. Since 2002, he has been a member and is now chair of the Council on Accreditation of the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs and has chaired site visits for the organization. Since 1976, he has served on the Ethics Committee of Cardinal Glennon Children's Hospital in St. Louis. Professor Goldner serves as co-editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Health Law*, published by the American Health Lawyers Association. In 2004, he received the Jay Healy Distinguished Health Law Teacher of the Year award from the American Society of Law, Medicine & Ethics. He received his A.B. (in political science) and M.A. (in psychology) from Columbia University and his J.D. from Harvard Law School.

Nancy Neveloff Dubler is the Director of the Division of Bioethics, Department of Epidemiology and Population Health, Montefiore Medical Center, and Professor of Epidemiology and Population Health at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine. She received her B.A. from Barnard College and her LL.B. from Harvard Law School. She directs the Bioethics Consultation Service at Montefiore Medical Center (founded in 1978), which provides analysis of difficult clinical cases presenting ethical issues in the health care setting. She lectures extensively and is the author of numerous articles and books on termination of care, home care and long-term care, geriatrics, prison and jail health care, and AIDS. She is Co-Director of the Certificate Program in Bioethics and the Medical Humanities, conducted jointly by Montefiore Medical Center/Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Cardozo Law School of Yeshiva University. She was a liaison from the Health Sciences Policy Board of the Institute of Medicine (IOM) to the IOM panel *Responsible Research: A Systems Approach to Protecting Research Participants*. She was the co-chair, with Mark Barnes, of the subcommittee on prison research of the Secretary's Advisory Committee on Human Research Protections (an advisory committee to the federal Office for Human Research Protections), and is an expert advisor to a new IOM committee on prison research. She was also Principal Investigator on a grant funded by the United Hospital Fund of New York City and the New York Community Trust to create a certificate program for non-affiliated and independent members of institutional review boards. She has been a member of the Montefiore Medical Center Institutional Review Board since 1976 and a vice-president of that Board since 1999. Her most recent books are: *Bioethics Mediation: A Guide to Shaping Shared Solutions* (with Carol

Liebman) (2004); *Ethics for Health Care Organizations: Theory, Case Studies, and Tools* (with Jeffrey Blustein and Linda Farber Post) (2002); and *Ethics On Call: Taking Charge of Life-and Death Choices in Today's Health Care System* (with David Nimmons) (1993). She consults often with federal agencies, national working groups, and bioethics centers.
